## MONTHLY MINIMUM CHARGE:

The monthly minimum charge is \$10.68 for non-heat customers and \$13.74 for heat customers served under Section 1 above exclusive of Commodity Cost Adjustment and \$12.72 exclusive of Commodity Cost Adjustment for non-heat customers and \$15.70 for heat customers served under Section 2 above. In addition to the minimum charge, customers may be required to pay a surcharge when service is taken from a main extension constructed in accordance with Rule 10, General Information.

## COMMODITY COST ADJUSTMENT:

The charges set forth herein shall be subject to a Commodity Cost Adjustment per Therm of gas supplied hereunder when changes from the base cost occur as explained in Rule 17 of this schedule.

## BTU ADJUSTMENT:

Volumes of gas registered at the customer's meter, in Ccf, will be adjusted for Btu content, in Therms, as stated in Rule 14.3.

## INCREASE IN RATES AND CHARGES:

The rates and charges under this service classification, including Commodity Cost Adjustment and minimum charge, will be increased by a tax factor pursuant to Rule 19.

## TERMS OF PAYMENT:

Bills are due and payable. Full payment must be received on or before the date shown on the bill to avoid a late payment charge of one and one-half percent (1 1/2%) pursuant to Rule 15.2.

## TERM:

For residential service without building heating, customer may terminate service after three days notice to Company. For all other service, one year and thereafter until canceled. This annual term provision will not apply in instances where delivery service customers are involuntarily switched back to sales service.
