New York State Electric & Gas Corporation ("NYSEG" or the "Company") hereby submits for filing the following enclosed Statements in compliance with the New York Public Service Commission's ("PSC" or "Commission's") Order Adopting Recommended Decision with Modifications, in Case 05-E-1222, issued and effective August 23, 2006 (the "Order").

MFC Statement No. 4 to PSC 120 – Electricity MFC Statement No. 4 to PSC 121 – Electricity

The above Merchant Function Charge (MFC) statements are being filed pursuant to General Information Section 25.I.D of Schedule PSC No. 120 - Electricity entitled, "Merchant Function Charge," allowing for updating the MFC to reflect recent migration levels and uncollectibles. Consistent with the methodology used to update the MFC for 2009, NYSEG:

- 1) Subtracted out the portion of the 2009 MFC, the amount related to commodity uncollectibles (excluding reserve adjustments)
- 2) Added in the commodity-related uncollectibles (excluding reserve adjustments) based on the most current 12 months. (TME November of current year)
- 3) Divided the updated MFC amount by the most current 12 month kilowatt-hour units from NYSEG's commodity rate options. (TME November of current year)

The MFC will be applicable to only those customers taking supply service from the Company (*i.e.*, NYSEG Supply Service and Hourly Pricing) and is set forth in the customer's Service Classification.
